**Earliest History of Mothers Day**

The earliest history of Mothers Day dates back to the ancient annual spring festival the Greeks dedicated to maternal goddesses. The Greeks used the occasion to honor Rhea, wife of Cronus and the mother of many deities of Greek mythology.

Ancient Romans, too, celebrated a spring festival, called Hilaria dedicated to Cybele, a mother goddess. It may be noted that ceremonies in honour of Cybele began some 250 years before Christ was born. The celebration made on the Ides of March by making offerings in the temple of Cybele lasted for three days and included parades, games and masquerades. The celebrations were notorious enough that followers of Cybele were banished from Rome.

Early Christians celebrated a Mother's Day of sorts during the festival on the fourth Sunday of Lent in honor of the Virgin Mary, the Mother of Christ. In England the holiday was expanded to include all mothers. It was then called Mothering Sunday. Origin of Mother's Day goes back to the era of ancient Greek and Romans. But the roots of Mother's Day history can also be traced in UK where a Mothering Sunday was celebrated much before the festival saw the light of the day in US. However, the celebration of the festival as it is seen today is a recent phenomenon and not even a hundred years old. Thanks to the hard work of the pioneering women of their times, Julia Ward Howe and Anna Jarvis that the day came into existence. Today the festival of Mothers day is celebrated across 46 countries (though on different dates) and is a hugely popular affair. Millions of people across the globe take the day as an opportunity to honor their mothers, thank them for their efforts in giving them life, raising them and being their constant support and well wishes. ### TWO KNYSNA SEA CADETS FOR USA

The success achieved by Petty Officer Amber Cloete was reported two weeks ago, to tell the public that she had been selected as the winner of the National Sea Cadet of the Year Competition. As her prize or reward we reported that she was going to visit the United States of America to join the US Cadets, and other cadet from other countries around the world, for a three week summer camp run by the US Navy at their Officer Training Facility on the East Coast.

Not only did Knysna have the honour of the Cadet of the Year (pictured right) coming from their unit, but the Cadet who came third in the Competition was also from Knysna, the Master at Arms Cadet Petty Officer Delisen Juries (pictured left). His reward will be to also travel to the USA with Amber Cloete to participate in the Cadet Summer Camp at Newport, Rhode Island. The two will learn a lot about life on the sea, and about the ways of life in other countries through mixing with cadet from eleven other countries.



Their commanding officer Lt. Commander Steve Eriksen is appealing to the residents of the greater Knysna area served by the Knysna Plett Herald to please assist with raising the funds necessary for their trip. The airfares from Johannesburg to the US and back have been sponsored, but their flights to and from Johannesburg have still to be paid, and the USA Visa must be obtained, together with camp fees of R1,800 each, and recommended pocket money of R2,500. The youngsters need to raise R7, 000 each, which is a daunting target. You will note that, in the interests of security, camera's have been installed to monitor movement to and from the Club.


